Problems arise when certain products are flushed down the toilet...

There has been an influx of products on the market that brag about easy disposal by flushing them down the toilet. While they can be flushed, this can become problematic. A large amount of these products can accumulate and cause blockages in sewer mains and laterals, ultimately causing messy backups in homes and businesses. In addition, these products are bulky and cause problems in treatment facilities and treatment processes. Pouring grease down the drain, throwing eggshells in a garbage disposal, and flushing diapers or feminine products also can contribute to problems in the sewer collection system and treatment plant.

Please, be conscious of what is flushed down the toilet or poured down the sink and the affects these products may have.

If you suspect a sewer blockage in your line, call the MUA first. PLBMUA employees will inspect the sewer main in the street and advise the property owner.

Eutrophication

Eutrophication is the increase of chemical nutrients, specifically compounds that contain nitrogen and phosphorous, in an ecosystem. Increase of nutrients is accelerated by run-off from lawn fertilizers into natural waters. Nutrients promote excessive plant growth, especially weeds, and disrupt the normal functioning of the lake, stream or river by causing numerous problems. Some are listed here...

- Decrease in biodiversity
- New species invasion
- Toxicity

When fertilizing lawns, use safe alternatives that do not contain phosphorous or nitrogen and make sure not to apply in excess. You can make a difference!

Winter is here and now is the time to protect your water meters and pipes from the cold months ahead. Precautionary measures can save you money and aggravation. Here are some suggestions...

- Install heat tape and/or insulation to your pipes, faucets or water meters that are located in unheated areas, like your basement or outside.
- Disconnect and drain outdoor hoses.
- Locate the master shutoff in your home and make sure that it is operational; in the event of a pipe bursting this can be very helpful.
- For your protection and that of your neighbors, please make sure snow is cleared from around fire hydrants near your home.
